



TRY IT AT HOME: MAKE A CAMPAIGN BUTTON

Objectives

Campers can imagine they are running for office or helping promote a candidate during an election. Use your creativity to create a cool campaign button to promote your candidacy and get people to notice you. Submit your button design to us and we'll send you a real button with your design!

Materials Needed

- Button design template sheet
- Coloring materials such as color pencils, markers, or if you have the skills design your button on the computer
- Example page of past campaign buttons for inspiration

Differentiation for Age Groups

Any camper can easily do this activity, but younger campers may want to stick to simple designs that focus more on a cool looking name and election year design. Middle and older campers may want to consider incorporating graphics related to their platform passions into their button or come up with a campaign slogan to display too.

Activity Instructions

Learn!

Campaign buttons can range from simple and straightforward to comical or rhyming. Some incorporate party symbols such as an elephant or a donkey. Other are buttons that are reminders against their running opponents and do not even have the candidates names on them! Think about what kind of campaign button you want to make. Can you rhyme something with your first or last name (ex I like Ike)? Do you have a clever slogan you want to promote (Yes We Can, Make America Great Again, Forward Together)? Can you come up with a pun that you could use to make for pet tags (ex: vote for Bark Obama or John McCainine)? What colors do you want to use? Can you create a memorable graphic to put on your button?
